Pregnancy Risks Rise for Teens in the Closet

May is Teen Pregnancy Prevention month; a month during which reproductive health care organizations such as Planned Parenthood take pause to reflect on the statistics, facts and real life stories of young people impacted by unintended pregnancy. One might assume this has little to do with LGBT youth, however analysis of teen pregnancy data from British Columbia, Canada tells a different story.

Lesbian, gay and bisexual teenagers are at significantly higher risk for pregnancy during their teen years than their heterosexual peers, suggests a survey in the Canadian Journal of Human Sexuality. The University of British Columbia study looked at adolescent health surveys of 1992, 1998, and 2003, which were random studies of about 70,000 students in Grades 7 through 12 in public schools across the province of B.C.

One of the reasons for higher pregnancy among sexual minority youth, say the report's authors, is the stigma gay teens continue to face and the strategies they may engage in order to cope with that stigma. For example, among the teenage girls surveyed in 1998, 7.3 percent of lesbians and 10.6 percent of girls who said they were bisexual reported pregnancy compared with 1.8 percent of heterosexual girls.

Among boys, the numbers were also higher for gay teenagers, with 9.6 of gay males and 11.6 percent

The Lesbian & Gay Family Building Project

What specific things would you like LGBT people to know about your services?

The Lesbian and Gay Family Building Project opened its doors on April 1, 2000, which means we just celebrated our tenth anniversary! We started as a resource for gay men and lesbians wanting to become parents, with a special focus on lesbians facing fertility challenges. Over the years, our programs and services have grown in every way and we have expanded our focus to include the health and wellbeing of LGBTQ parents, their kids, and prospective parents.

Current programs include our **Pride and Joy Families Network**, which offers support, education and a sense of community to the adults and children in LGBTQ families across upstate New York. The Network has grown to more than 500 households, with the strongest presence in Syracuse, Binghamton, and Rochester, where groups meet regularly. We have 3 websites:

The latter is our online, searchable database of welcoming health and human service providers, which has grown from 180 to 450 welcoming attorneys, sperm banks, therapists, adoption agencies, etc. We are doing more work providing educational programs and information on LGBTQ families and parenting to educators and other professionals who come into contact with our families. Our LGBT Healthy Families Initiative offers resources and information

specific to LGBTQ families to help create better health outcomes for the adults and children in these families.

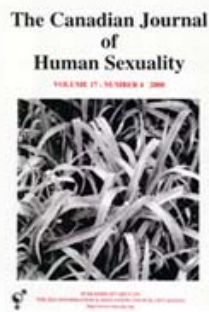

of bisexual teen boys reporting involvement with a pregnancy, compared with 1.5 percent of heterosexual young men. In 2003, pregnancy rates declined slightly overall, but remained much higher among gay and lesbian teens than heterosexual teens.

The report suggests that for youth, the stigma of being gay may lead to engaging in opposite sex dating and sex as a form of "camouflage" to avoid being identified as a gay teen. "Those who experience harassment and discrimination may choose pregnancy involvement as a way to deny their orientation, to prevent further enacted stigma," the report suggests.

The numbers vary between girls and boys when it comes to the relationship between pregnancy and discrimination. Of the girls surveyed, 100 per cent of



those who had become pregnant also said they had been discriminated against on the basis of their sexuality, while only 42.7 per cent of lesbian girls who said they had never been pregnant cited discrimination. Only 18.4 per cent of gay teenage boys who were involved in getting a woman pregnant said they had experienced discrimination, while 60.4 per cent of those who were not involved in pregnancy said they had not been discriminated against.

Other explanations for the higher rates of pregnancy may be the higher number of gay and lesbian youth who live on the streets. The study finds that street youth - those who have run away from home, for example - are at higher risk for teen pregnancy, in part because survival sex or sexual exploitation can increase the frequency of sex and make it difficult to negotiate contraception and safer sexual practices. The study also suggests a higher number of gay and lesbian teens are experiencing sex at a younger age - under 14 - than their heterosexual peers. **Want more info? sieccan.org**

What you need to know about ENDA and transgender rights

Right now, people can be fired in 29 states for being lesbian, gay, or bisexual, and in 38 states for being transgender. The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, PFLAG National, National Center for Transgender Equality, National Black Justice Coalition, National Stonewall Democrats, National Center for Lesbian Rights, and Pride at Work are urging Congress to pass the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA).
